#### SURINAMESE AMBASSADOR ADVOCATES FOR CULTURAL EXCHANGE WITH GHANA

The Suriname's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Ghana, Her Excellency Mrs. Fedelia Graand-Galon, has urged Ghanaians to collaborate with Surinamese to strengthen their bilateral cultural ties.



The Ambassador made the call when the Executive Director of the National Commission on Culture Madam Janet Edna Nyame paid a courtesy visit to her to deliberate on possible ways the two countries could collaborate in cultural exchange programs. Suriname is a continent in South America with Dutch as its official language. The country is made up of a multi-ethnic group of people with a population of a little over half a million with "Sranantogo" as the common language which is wildly spoken among all the ethnic groups in the country.

The Ambassador in the meeting with the Executive Director stated that, Ghana is important to Suriname

because the Transatlantic Slave Trade caused some people of Ghanaian descendants to be shipped to Suriname.

She expressed her admiration and love for Ghana and further reiterated that, Surinamese have resemblance to Ghanaians, with regards to the lifestyle of the Akans in terms of naming ceremony, puberty rites and chieftaincy.

"I wish to have cultural programmes rolled out to, inform people about the similarities between the two countries (Ghana and Suriname) when it comes to culture. As African descendants, especially the Maroons, kept some of the cultures their ancestors used to practice; like naming ceremonies, puberty rites and the six tribal communities with paramount chiefs and chiefs in the hinterland of Suriname" the Ambassador

Mrs. Galon revealed to the Executive Director that, though the Suriname is situated in South America, they are not really known; instead the focus is on the Netherland, European country whose culture is totally different compared to the Surinamese.

According to the Ambassador, this is problematic to Surinam's and she looks forward to organise food fairs and artistic cultural activities where Surinamese and Ghanaian artists can perform together to exchange ideas on how both countries can share their culture with each other.

She used the occasion to invite the Executive Director to lead some delegates from Ghana to attend the Surinamese upcoming Mamo Festival slated on the November 15, 2022.

The programme which was held at the Nana Bosoma market brought together various stakeholders such as financial institutions, media houses, other public sector workers, market women and the general public.

Notable Ghanaian foods such as; apapransa, banku ne nkruma nkwan, apiti, nuhuu, bankye ampesie ne mako abomu, Fufuo ne abunabunu nkwan, Adibiankyenewom were prepared right in the market amidst the spectacular performance by the center's culture troupe.

The programme, which was propagated by the Sunyani Hemaa Nana Akosua Duaah Asor Sika Brayie II intended to showcase, sensitize and educate the public on the nutritional value and health benefits of traditional cuisine and to encourage the growing and consumption of local foods.

The queenmothers used the platform to appeal to mothers to teach their daughters how to prepare local meals rather than patronizing imported foods as they decried the inability of people to prepare local dishes especially the girl-child due to lack of knowledge and training from home.

They again underscore the role traditional food play in providing employment for the youth as well as improving household income since they are available and accessible.

The Director for Centre for National Culture in a statement commended the queen mothers for such initiative and appealed to them to make it an annual programme to be held in March as part of activities of the Ghana month.

The Centre for National Culture in the Sekyere East District has embark on arts and talent hunt by using acrylic paints to discover the artistic abilities as efforts to promote paintings as virtual medium to express the arts and culture of the people.

A ream of A3 sheets, several colors of acrylic paint, and disposable bowls were purchased by the District Cultural Office for the project with assistance from the Regional Office.

Although the schools were required to supply their own brushes, it was noted that the pupils were quite enthusiastic to participate and were very pleased with the project's outcome made the organisers to produce additional papers for other pupils to practice their artistic talent.

As art is vital for the pupils and allow them study about themselves, their culture and their community, Centre hopes to continue the search for artistic potential in the next quarter by using various mediums to allow the expression of truth and beliefs.

## Effects of Unrestrained Globalisation on Cultural Values - Asheikh M. B. Ibn Hassan

Thus, as globalisation is known to be driven by the convergence of cultural and economic systems which promotes, and in some cases necessitates, increased interaction among countries, it is imperative that as a country, Ghana takes a second look at it cultural policies to ensure that it adequately protects the country's cultural value systems.

#### Effects of Unrestrained Globalisation on Cultural Values - Asheikh M. B. Ibn Hassan

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Increasingly, many societies across the globe particularly those in Africa, are gradually losing their cultures to modernity due to the unrestrained wind of globalisation that has been blowing fast across every nook and cranny of the world. Ubiquitous and powerful as the phenomenon is; many cultures around the world today are being rendered ineffective in their en deavour to preserve and protect their unique cultural value systems, making them susceptible to various forms of threats including possible extinction. Ghana is not spared from this global canker either, as the phenomenon can be evidently seen to have pervaded all aspects of its national life--social, cultural, religious, economic and political. This piece seeks to throw some light on how influential the phenomenon is and draw the attention of relevant stakeholders to, as a matter of urgency, take steps to safeguard Ghana's culture from becoming victim of cultural hegemony.

Inarguably, Ghana's cultural heritage has had its fair share of value erosion as a result of globalisation.

Many have expressed concerns about the proliferation of several Western lifestyles in the Ghanaian society to the extent that sometimes people relegate their own cultural values to the background.

alobalisation has a considerable influence on several areas of contemporary societies' ways of life. For this reason, many critics of the ideology argue that it is potentially harmful to cultural diversity asserting that, when a dominating country's culture is introduced into a receiving country through alobalisation, it can become a threat to the diversity of local culture. Others even argue that globalisation may ultimately lead to Westernisation or Americanisation of culture believing that the dominating cultural concepts of economically and politically powerful Western countries could spread and cause harm to local cultures. Of course as globalisation entails the opening up of one's coun try to foreign trade, investments and cultural exchanges among others, it implies that the world is like a single unit. In fact in this era of the internet, it has even become more difficult for any country to grow or develop in seclusion from the rest of the world. In the world today, globalisation is considered as a necessary part of development process of every country. Mott, 2004; Panopio & Santico Rolda, 2006; and Ferraro, 2008 observe that "globalisation and technological advancements in the twentieth and twenty first centuries have brought radical transformations into people's cultures and traditions" and have "dictated a lopsided transfer of culture in favour of hegemonic global relation ships that often promote Western culture against other ways of life" adding that "these transformations have often only satisfied contemporary hegemonic and consumerist lifestyles."



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
